A WELL-BALANCED MECHANISM




Power is shared by the federal government, the 26 cantons and around 2,000 communes.

SUBSIDIARITY

The cantons and communes have authority over a wide range of matters (e.g. schools, hospitals, tax and policing) and a great deal of autonomy. The federal government only takes on tasks that the cantons and communes cannot manage alone.


Federalism is what allows the different aspects of Switzerland, with its four national languages and large geographical differences, to coexist. Federalism was one of the founding principles of the Swiss Confederation in 1848. Every canton has its own constitution, parliament, government and courts. About a fifth of communes have their own parliament, in particular the cities.

u^b Health insurance Health insurance is compulsory

The compulsory health insurance system Guide



- Everybody who lives and/or works in Switzerland must take out Swiss compulsory health insurance within 3 months of their arrival.
- <u>The compulsory health</u> insurance system (Guide)

u^b Exemption possible Requirements

Regular Swiss health insurance is expensive.

International students who are living in Switzerland for the purpose of basic/continuing education and training may apply for exemption.

They must prove that they have <u>private</u> or <u>national</u> health insurance that is **equivalent** to a regular Swiss health insurance.

The health insurance must confirm to the cantonal health authorities that they meet all Swiss health obligation laws and provide medical coverage under the same conditions.

Possible insurances are

- EU health insurance (but only for students without employment)
- private health insurance in your home country
- "international student insurance" recognized in the canton of Bern

u^b Application for an exemption How to proceed in the canton of Bern (1)

Arrival in Bern.	Make sure you have health insurance!	Hand in online application for exemption.				
Max. 3 months!						

- Normally the health insurance will guide you through the process or you can ask them directly.
- Before obtaining a health insurance plan, ask the company, if they will sign the application form for an exemption.
- Selection of companies that provide health insurance for international students:
 - Swiss Care
 - Swica Student Insurance
 - Groupe Mutuel / Academic Care
 - Advisor Student Insurance

u^b Application for exemption How to proceed in the canton of Bern (2)

Please fill in the <u>online form</u>.

- Same form for people with private health insurance provider or EHIC.
- You might need your social security number (*AHV-Number*, 756.xxxx.xxx).
 - Students with a work contract may ask their employer for this number
 - Others should simply contact the migration office in their commune of residence ("Einwohnerdienste").

u^b Application for exemption How to proceed in the canton of Bern (3)

- If you have private health insurance: obtain their signature as instructed.
 - They must sign and stamp the form. By this they agree to fully comply with Swiss rules under the Federal Act on Health Insurance.
 - Ask them if they will sign the application for exemption before obtaining a health insurance plan.
- If you have an EHIC you should not need any signature.
- Hand in the form including all necessary documents as instructed.
 - Copy of university matriculation
 - Copy of residence permit
 - Work contract (if applicable)
 - Further details for family or spouse (if applicable)
 - EHIC (if applicable)



If you have any troubles with filling in the online form, please contact the relevant office, listed on the right side of the website (*Amt für Sozialversicherungen Obligatorium*).


- If the application is accepted, you will receive a confirmation with an expiry date.
- Unless you situation as international student has changed, you must re-apply for exemption before the expiry date.

u^{\flat} Safety in Bern

Even though serious crime statistics are relatively low, you should be careful.

Keep your belongings close! Petty crime is on the rise, e.g., pickpockets or theft of bycicles. Take care at tourist spots and on public transport.

Keep an eye on your drink in clubs or at concerts to ensure nobody spills anything in it (spiking). It's best to go out with friends and look out for each other.

Overall, be careful and vigilant as in all big cities.

Documents needed: residence permit & student card

Most banks will <u>not</u> open an account without a residence permit. Until then, make sure you can get money with your national credit card or through money transfer.

u^b Finding a part-time jobStudent jobs

- All foreign students are allowed a maximum of 15 hours of work per week (exception: semester break).
- Students from non-EU countries are <u>not</u> allowed to take up work in the <u>first 6</u> <u>months</u> of their stay in Switzerland.
- Employer is responsible for the work permit.
- Migration Office must be informed about the job. Sometimes they will ask for the consent of the University > your Dean's Office.

How to find a part-time job?

Job Office Students Union SUB (www.sub.unibe.ch), notice boards, newspapers, online portals etc

Good knowledge of German or French will improve your prospects on finding jobs.

Driving with a foreign license

- If you live in Switzerland, you may drive with a foreign license for 12 months. After that, you are required to have a Swiss license.
- You need to exchange your foreign license for a Swiss license; this is still possible after the 12month grace period, but you may have to pay a fine.

Exchanging a foreign license

The procedures vary depending on which country issued the foreign license. In any case, you must produce the original driving license and take an eye test.
